May Tip of the Month - Purple Invasive Thistles

It is time to tackle your thistles – they are beginning to bloom and their seeds travel far and wide!

They are non-native, unsightly, spread aggressively and many can render land unusable. They also have very annoying spines that can penetrate leather gloves. Now is a great time to get them out – before they bloom.

Thistles can be managed with mowing or weed-whacking, but you may need mow again later in the season because many can re-sprout from the root. They can be left as mulch, unless the blossoms have begun to open, at which point they should be bagged and disposed of in garbage.
